Devī Mahātmyā Purānam, a recitative hymn of 700 mantras (verses) that forms part of the Markandeva Purāna

Ardhanariśvara, Elephanta, Kalachuri Dynasty, 540-555 CE Śiva and Śaktī, the essential male and female principles of the Universe.

Durgā, Udayagiri, Cave 6, Gupta Dynasty, 401-2 CE (dated by inscription)

Durgā Cave, Mamallapuram. Pallava dynasty, mid-7th century

Durgā relief, Kailasanatha Rock-cut Temple, Ellora, Rastrakuta Dynasty, c. 757-973 CE

Durgā Slaying Mahisa, Bhuhanesvara, Orissa, 9th century

Durgā, Chola Dynasty, 10th century, granite. AAM, San Francisco (B64S10)

Anantaśayin, Visnu in his Cosmic Sleep threatened by the demons Madhu and Kaitabha.

Durgā manifests herself as Māhāmâyā, Great Delusion

Anantaśayin Relief, Deogarh, Gupta Dynasty, c. 500-550 CE

Durgā Pūjā: The Worship of Durgā, celebrated each Fall

Durgā Blessing Śivaji's Sword, 17th century Marathi Leader
