Brief Overview

The history of Chinese art represents 5,000 years of illustrious uninterrupted artistic creation and expression. China has given to the world some of the most venerable art forms known to humanity, including calligraphy (shū fǎ, 书法) and ancient Chinese painting (guó huà, 国画). The extensive chronology of art production in China suggests that avant-garde Chinese art was born in 1979. Since then the field of contemporary Chinese art (zhōng guó xiàndài yìshù, 中国现代艺术) has emerged as one of the most compelling and provocative areas in the sphere of international art. The diversified work of contemporary Chinese artists references the ancient aesthetic traditions of China while reflecting the remarkable transformations happening in all facets of Chinese society today.

Historical Periods

Wu Hung, a distinguished scholar and leading authority on both traditional and contemporary Chinese art, classifies four distinct phases in the development of Chinese art post-Cultural Revolution (1966-1976):

1979 – 1984 | the emergence of unofficial art around China

1985 – 1989 | the '85 Art New Wave movement & "China/Avant-Garde" exhibition of 1989

1990 – 1993 | post '89 period and the internationalization of Chinese art

1994 – late 1990's and beyond | strong domestic turn, widespread changes in Chinese society, art as a social and cultural critique
