Pax Mongolica

Cathay (referring to northern China and the abstract Far East during the Mongol period) *khitā ī* or *khatā ī* (Persian, meaning "Cathayan" or of/from Cathay) *nasīj* ("cloth of gold and silk") *Shāhnāma* or *Shāhnāmeh* ("Book of Kings") of Firdawsi (d. 1020), *ca.* 1010 *lājvardīna mīnā ī* ("enameled") or *haft rangī* ("seven-colored") *sīmurgh* or *feng-huang* (phoenix) *kitābkhāna* or *kitābkhaneh* (lit. "bookhouse", Persian for library-atelier)
