West Asia (Qamar Adamjee)

Terms used:

Qaba' (Arabic): sleeved, tailored, mid-calf length coat, open down the front; worn over a shirt, with a belt, baggy trousers and boots.

Qaba'-i Turki: lit. "Turkic qaba'," a variant of the Arab-style coat distinguished by its overlapping front where the front panels are crossed one over the other and tied or buttoned on the side. It was worn widely across Central Asia and Iran.

Kabayi: Term for the Arab-style qaba' in Vijaynagara

Qamis (Arabic): undershirt worn below the qaba'

Kulah (Persian): a high or medium-high cap made of cloth

Kullayi: Term for the Persian kulah in Vijaynagara

Khil'a (Arabic): robe of honor
