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TIMELINE

1914-1918	First World War and the defeat of the Ottoman Empire in the Middle East. British and French Occupation of former Ottoman provinces
1923-38	Mustafa Kemal Atatürk, first President of Turkey
1925	In Iran overthrow of Qajar dynasty and establishment of Pahlavi Dynasty under Reza Shah (r. 1925-1941)
1932	Proclamation of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia Iraq independence from Great Britain
1939-45	Second World War
1941-79	Mohammad Reza Shah, the last Pahlavi monarch, succeeds his father
1946	Full independence of Lebanon and Syria from France
1948	Establishment of the state of Israel and flight of Palestinian refugees
1951	Iranian Prime Minister Mossadegh nationalizes Iranian oil
1952	Military coup abolishes monarchy in Egypt
1953	A US and British backed coup removes the Prime Minister Mohammad Mossadegh
1967	War between Israel and the Arab states ends in victory for Israel and occupation of historical Palestine, including Jerusalem
1975 -90	Lebanese Civil War
1977	Inauguration of the Tehran Museum of Contemporary Art (TMOCA)
1979	Iranian Revolution resulting in overthrow of the Pahlavi regime and the establishment of the Islamic Republic, led by Ayatollah Khomeini
1980-88	Iran-Iraq War
1987	First Istanbul Biennial
1989	Ayatollah Khomeini dies and is succeeded as Supreme Leader by Ayatollah Ali Khamenei
1993	First Sharjah Biennial

2003	Invasion of Iraq and overthrow of the Baathist regime, led by Saddam Hussein
2009	In Iran Mahmoud Ahmadinejad re-elected president for a second term. The disputed election results in Green Movement demonstrations.
2011	The start of the Arab Spring Downfall of Egyptian President Mubarak Civil war in Syria
2013-21	Hassan Rouhani replaces Ahmadinejad as President
2014-	Recep Tayyip Erdogan serves as President of Turkey
2015	Nuclear agreement between Iran and the five permanent members of the UN Security Council, Germany and the EU
2018	President Trump withdraws from the nuclear deal

TERMINOLOGY

Calligraphy: Beautiful handwriting

Khosh nevissi: Beautiful handwriting in Persian

Naghashi khatt: Calligraphic modernism or textual abstraction in Persian

Chador: The head- to-toe veil worn by a certain segment of Iranian women

Hannoun: Poppies in the Palestinian dialect. They are associated with the memory of freedom fighters.

Kaaba: Cube in Arabic. Building located near the center of the Great Mosque in Mecca. Muslims orient themselves toward this shrine during the five daily prayers and circle it during the hajj or the holy pilgrimage.

Mecca: Holy city in Saudi Arabia and birthplace of the Prophet Muhammad

Mesopotamia: Historical region between the Tigris and Euphrates rivers. It occupies mostly present-day Iraq.

Ottoman Empire: Created by Turkish tribes in Anatolia that grew to be one of the most powerful states in the world. It controlled much of Southeastern Europe, Western Asia and Northern Africa and spanned more than 600 years, coming to an end in 1922

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Persia: How Iran was referred to since ancient times until 1935, when Reza Shah Pahlavi (r. 1925-1941) instructed all foreign governments to use "Iran" – meaning the land of Aryans (at the time a loaded and strategic identity).
Sufism: Mystic branch of Islam
