Book lovers, mark your calendars: thousands of books – including rare collector's items – will be available at bargain prices at our Annual Book Sale in the Asian Art Museum Loggia. This year's special four-day event includes both a Thursday night, when the museum remains open until 8 p.m., and a Free First Sunday, when admission is free for all.

Visitors are invited to browse desirable volumes on Asian art (from catalogs from past exhibitions at the museum to out-of-print gems like He Li's guide to Chinese ceramics), as well as unique publications on history, literature, religion, culture, cooking, novels, travel, textiles, jewelry and more! Among this year's rarities: By Imperial Command, a two-volume guide to Ch'ing painted enamels limited to 1,000 copies; a sumptuously illustrated, boxed survey of Japanese Kabuki stages; Liu Xiaodong's 2008 monograph Painting from Life (featuring text by Ai Weiwei); a collection of albums of Indian miniature paintings; and a large selection of books on Japanese woodblock prints.

Besides adding a new treasure to your coffee table or library, your book purchase will benefit the museum's C. Laan Chun Library. To date, the Society for Asian Art Book Sale has raised more than \$120,000 for the museum library, one of the most comprehensive research libraries on Asian art and culture in the country.

Global Connections: Asia and the Arts in the Second Millennium of the Common Era

The Society for Asian Art presents Global Connections: Asia and the Arts in the Second Millennium of the Common Era, the 3rd part of a 3-part lecture series focusing on the effects of technology and the environment on the arts and culture of Asia. Join us in the Asian Art Museum's Samsung Hall to attend these lectures in-person, or view the lectures on Zoom.

Beginning in the Steppes of East Asia, explore the impact of the Mongol empire as it exploded west, forming the Ilkhanid Dynasty in Persia and east, forming the Yuan Dynasty in China. Follow the Ottoman Empire as it expanded from its center in Bursa and Constantinople – an empire that continued into the 20th century. The Mughals of South Asia continued the legacy of both Persia and the Mongols, and the Little Ice Age (1550–1850) affected Indian religion and culture. Climate and geography affected the rise of empires in Southeast Asia and triggered conflicts in the strategic location of the Korean Peninsula.



Ghosts of Gold Mountain relates the epic history of the Chinese who built the Transcontinental Railroad. Gordon Chang's book draws from more than seven years of work conducted by the Chinese Railroad Workers in North America Project at Stanford, a project co-directed by him. As a professor of history at Stanford and multi-media expert, his many books and publications focus on US-China issues, bringing Chinese American voices to light, and on Asian American art history.

Gordon Chang, a fourth-generation Californian, is Senior Associate Vice Provost for Under Graduate Education and the Olive H. Palmer Professor in Humanities at Stanford University. He has also served as the Director of the Asian American Studies Program and the Center for East Asian Studies at Stanford. A charismatic and engaging speaker, Dr. Chang will share with us many of the untold stories of the building of the Transcontinental Railroad in this presentation.

Chinatown Rising – A Documentary Film With Josh Chuck

Against the backdrop of the Civil Rights Movement of the mid 1960's, a young San Francisco Chinatown resident, Harry Chuck, armed with a 16 mm camera and leftover film scraps from a local TV station, turned his lens onto his community.

Chinatown Rising is a documentary film about the Asian American movement from the perspective of the young residents on the front line of their historic neighborhood in transition. Forty-five years later, in intimate interviews, these activists recall their roles and experiences in response to the need for social change.

This documentary, which has an 85-minute run time, will be introduced by Josh Chuck, who will be present to answer questions and discuss the movie with attendees.





Come join us for a spring gathering at Hakone Estate & Gardens in Saratoga, where we hope to see cherry blossoms in full bloom. An 18-acre hill-and-pond garden with Japanese landscape design and architecture, Hakone is a National Trust for Historic Preservation site and it is also listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

We will begin our visit with a talk by one of the co-authors of the 2021 book, *Hakone Estate and Gardens*, Ann Waltonsmith, on the history and resilience of the owners and gardeners during the anti-immigrant laws and anti-Asian actions in America's recent past. Ms. Waltonsmith is currently the chairperson of the Hakone Foundation Board of Trustees and is a former Saratoga City Council member. We will then break for lunch at the group picnic lunch site, so bring your own lunch. A piece of fruit and a cookie will be provided. (Lunch and beverages are NOT included.) After lunch, we will be treated to a tea ceremony demonstration, followed by a docent-guided tour of the gardens. Participants are encouraged to linger in the gardens after the event ends around 3:00 p.m.

SAA volunteer ushers will be on-site until 10:55 a.m. to direct participants to the talk. Please allow time for parking and walking to the main room in the Lower House, where Ann Waltonsmith's talk begins at 11:00 a.m. Participants are encouraged to carpool.
