

New Japanese Clay

On View through Feb. 2, 2026 in the Hambrecht Contemporary Gallery

Don't miss the opportunity to see contemporary Japanese ceramics from the recently donated collection of Dr. Phyllis A. Kempner and Dr. David D. Stein.

This exhibition illuminates the diverse forms, textures, and techniques of contemporary ceramics from Japan. These works push the boundaries of a centuries-old tradition, offering a striking redefinition of the medium's expressive potential. The exhibition also introduces the makers behind the works on view. "This new generation of potters from Japan are building on the legacy of the *mingei* (folk art) movement while charting their own boldly experimental courses," says Chief Curator and exhibition curator Dr. Robert Mintz, who notes that many of the featured artists maintain social media accounts offering behind-the-scenes looks at their studio process.

Join exhibition curator Aleesa Pitchamarn Alexander, who will lead us through this career spanning exhibition of the internationally renowned New York-based artist Shazia Sikander. Born in Pakistan, Sikander has been reframing visual histories through a contemporary feminist perspective for 3 decades, through diverse media and traditions – such as South Asian miniature paintings to digital animation, revealing a vibrant visual universe that re-imagines the past for our present moment.

This exhibition is part of Cantor's Asian American Art Initiative and was premiered in 2024 at the 60th Venice Biennale.



Modern and Contemporary Movements in Japanese Art with Robert Mintz

This study group will explore some of the major movements and trends in Japanese Modern and Contemporary art. Dividing the lecture into three sections, we will first explore prewar, 20th century movements that gave shape to what we now can see as Japanese Modernism. The second section will look at the post-war period and the movements that emerged in reaction to the cultural and social challenges of the 1950s-1980s. In the final section we will explore some of the major artists forming and leading the Contemporary art movement today.

Robert Mintz is the Chief Curatorial Director / Chief Curator at the Asian Art Museum. In his position, he oversees the curatorial research and exhibitions programs, and he guides the growth, preservation, and presentation of the museum's art collections. Rob is a specialist in Edo period Japanese art history with a keen interest in literati paintings and the decorative arts. With degrees from the University of Michigan and the University of Washington, he has spent his career working in public art museums previously serving as a researcher at the Seattle Art Museum, and later as curator of Asian Art and Chief Curator at the Walters Art Museum.

Zoroaster: The Most Influential Philosopher and Prophet in History with Mitra Ara

This study group examines Zoroaster, an Indo-Iranian prophet whose philosophical teachings significantly influenced the development of Zoroastrianism, a tradition that began in the midsecond millennium BCE. The analysis presents Zoroaster as a prominent prophet who has shaped later Abrahamic religions and Western philosophy, positioning him as an early supporter of revealed religion. Zoroaster's core beliefs, including dualistic cosmology, eschatology, and the ongoing battle between good and evil, continue to impact modern ethical, moral, and philosophical discussions. The lecture highlights Zoroaster's substantial historical influence and the continuing importance of his ideas in debates about ethics, free will, and human purpose.

Dr. Mitra Ara is a cultural historian and professor at San Francisco State University, where she teaches classes in multiple departments. She earned her B.A. in Religious Studies, her M.A. in South and Southeast Asian Studies with a focus on Sanskrit and Avestan religious traditions, and her Ph.D. in Asian Studies from the University of California, Berkeley. She has written several books, numerous articles, and has spoken at conferences and colloquia.
