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Dynasties mentioned in the lecture:

622: beginning of a new era marking the Hegira or Emmigration of the Prophet Muhammad and his Followers from Mekka to Medina, the expansion of Islam is launched from Medina.

685-705: Reign of Abd al-Malik the Umayyad- establishment of Arabic as an official language, first monumental architecture

749-1258: Abbasid Dynasty rules from Baghdad: expansion of Islam continues to expand both east and west, by land and by sea.

819-1005: The Samanids rule in eastern Iran and Afghanistan including the city of Nishapur.

977-1186: The Ghaznavids rule from Lashkari Bazaar and Ghazna in Afghanistann.

1258-1349: The Mongol Ilkhans remove the last Abbasid Caliph and establish their own dynasty that is linked to the Mongol rulers of China (The Yuan Dynasty: 1260-1350's)

1232-1492: The Nasrids of Spain

1501-1722: The Safavids of Iran
