Stories of the lives of eminent Buddhist monks, biographies of high priests

Engi 縁起

Stories of the founding of temples and shrines, and the lives and miraculous powers of Buddhist monks

Meisho 名所, meisho-e 名所絵 Famous places, pictures of famous places

Mayahana Sutra of Questions of a Virtuous Woman (*Utanokyo shomon daijōkyo*), approx. 1100-1200. Handscroll, gold and silver on blue paper. Asian Art Museum, B60 D116

Illustrated Sutra of Cause and Effect (E inga kyo), 8th century. Handscroll; ink and colors on paper. Nara National Museum

Hell scroll (Jigoku zōshi), late 12th century. Handscroll; ink and colors on paper. Tokyo National Museum (Anjū'in scroll)

Frolicking Animals Scroll (Chōjū giga), 12th century. Handscroll; ink on paper. Kōzanji, Kyoto and private and museum collections.
