- II. The Yangshao Period (5000-3000 BC) Cultural diversity and increase in sociopolitical complexity; origins of Chinese ritual art (painted pottery, jades)
- III. The Terminal Neolithic/Chalcolithic: The Longshan Period (3000-2000 BC) Transition to urban settlement; regional systems of exchange; ritual art connected to the ancestral cult (high-end ceramics, jades)
- IV. The Early Bronze Age: Erlitou and Its Contemporaries (1900-1500 BC). Technological and artistic innovations connected to the rise of the state-level civilization (bronzes, monumental architecture)
